GREAT CANADIAN RAILWAY ADVENTURE

VIA Rail Canada and Fairmont Hotels & Resorts let visitors zoom cross-country on a 20-day train trip. For nights not spent on board, passengers stay at Fairmont properties, including Le Château Frontenac in Quebec City (above) — the world's most-photographed hotel (from \$9,990/person; Fairmont.com).

OTTAWA SKY LOUNGE

Ottawa rings in Canada's anniversary with Ignite 150, a series of out-of-the-ordinary events. From July 7 to 22, thrill-seekers can head to the Sky Lounge — a dining table suspended 150 feet above

ground — for cocktails and bites (\$125; Ottawa2017.ca).

BANFF NATIONAL PARK

For its birthday, tourists can visit Canada's national parks for free. Head to Banff — Canada's first national park. Nestled in the Rockies, it's known for alpine scenery, rafting and hiking (BanffNationalPark.com).

MONTREAL

Montreal marks its 375th birthday this month. Celebrations include the multimedia Avudo display in the Old Port. The show illustrates the history of the St. Lawrence River (375MTL.com).
