Forget the King's Road, these *Game of Thrones* Tours Take You to Dragonstone, Highgarden and More Season 7 Spots

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Between the gory battle scenes and nail-biting intrigue of HBO's hit show *Game of Thrones*, you might have noticed all the stunning landscapes and wished you could visit (during a long, peaceful summer, of course).

Thanks to some clever tour companies, it turns out, you can!

Thrones fans can book a number of tours all around Europe that feed into their obsession, but two new itineraries from [Zicasso](#) are especially intriguing as they incorporate settings from the current season.

One [tour in Spain](#) follows in the “footsteps of Daenerys Targaryen when walking on the sands of Itzurun Beach,” the guide notes, as she makes her long awaited return to the Seven Kingdoms. You might not see any dragons along the way, but that probably won’t stop you from feeling like a Khaleesi in the breathtaking seaside location.

Then, head to Castillo de Almodóvar del Río, which stands in for House Tyrell’s castle, Highgarden, and Alcázar of Seville, the filming location for House Martell’s Water Gardens in Dorne.

For those who hold faith with the North, head to [Iceland](#), where you can feel like you’ve ventured north of the Wall. Of course, you probably won’t run into the Night King or White Walkers, but you will see Northern Lights, basalt pillars and living geysers.

If you’re really determined to see the whole of Westeros and Essos, try a self-guided adventure.

[Liligo.com](#) mapped out an entire round-the-world itinerary hitting all of the *Game of Thrones* filming locations. A month-long trip will cost \$2,465 (for flights alone), according to their estimates.

The itinerary includes destinations across the nine countries where “Game of Thrones” has filmed. Starting from New York City, head to Iceland, where Jon Snow and the Night’s Watch had scenes; Northern Ireland, which has a ton of destinations from the series; Scotland, where fans should head to Doune Castle; Dubrovnik, Croatia; Seville, Spain; Morocco’s UNESCO World Heritage Site, Ait Ben Haddou; Malta, where the scenes for the Free City of Pentos in season one were filmed; then on to Los Angeles, where Brienne of Tarth’s face of with a bear went down; and finally Calgary, Canada, where parts of season five were filmed.

A month-long trip around the world doesn't sound half bad.

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
